



Bertha M Heisey (Sollenberger)

February 6, 1923 - September 24, 2014

Bertha Mae Sollenberger Heisey, 91, passed away on Wednesday, September 24, 2014 in Chambersburg, Pennsylvania. She was born on February 6, 1923 in Guilford Springs, Pennsylvania, the daughter of the late Avery L. and Frances H. (Wingert) Sollenberger.

In her youth, Bertha was a member of the Air Hill Brethren in Christ congregation of Chambersburg, Pennsylvania. From 1968 to 2003 she was a member of the Green Spring Spring Brethren in Christ Church in Newville, Pennsylvania. When she moved to Menno Village in 2003, she returned to Air Hill, the church of her youth.

Until finishing grade 8 she was a student at the Culbertson Schoolhouse, and then attended Messiah Academy in Grantham, Pennsylvania, graduating in 1941.

Her work life included the Christian Light Press and the Dean's Office at Messiah College, and then many years helping to run the family farm, first in Gardners, and then later in Newville. She also raised five children.

Bertha enjoyed the many duties of farm life, running a busy household, and motherhood, including sewing, growing bountiful food in the garden and preparing it for her family, raising various animals for the family's needs,

fostering music in family life, and most of all, cultivating her spiritual life. Her relationship with the Lord was a vivid part of her daily life, and affected her family deeply in many ways.

Bertha is survived by her son Adriel R. Heisey of Gallup, New Mexico; daughter Aspen F. Heisey of Guelph, Ontario, Canada; daughter Frances L. Drost, of Newville, Pennsylvania; daughter-in-law Nancy G. Crider of Carlisle, Pennsylvania; granddaughter Crystal L. Dailey of York, Pennsylvania; granddaughter Kelly J. Albert of Dillsburg, Pennsylvania; granddaughter D. Paige Boersma of Toronto, Canada; grandson Kjell J. Boersma of Toronto, Canada; step-granddaughter Shea Shochat of Seattle, Washington; step-grandson Orin P. Shochat of Santa Monica, California; seven great-grandchildren; one step-great-grandson and brother Avery Sollenberger of Hanover, Pennsylvania; and twenty nieces and nephews.

Bertha was preceded in death by her first husband Paul D. Crider (1947), her second husband H. Orville Heisey (2001), son P. Douglas Crider (1973), son Nathan C. Heisey (1966), father Avery L. Sollenberger (1974), mother Frances H. (Wingert) Sollenberger (1976), brother Vernon Sollenberger (1919), brother Kenneth Sollenberger (1927), and brother Chester Sollenberger (1990).
