



## Mrs. Lorene Magdalene Martin

October 27, 1942 - May 16, 2021

Lorene M. Zehr Martin, 78 passed away on Sunday, May 16 at Chambersburg Hospital following a brief illness. She was the wife of Eugene R. Martin. They shared 47 wonderful years together.

Born in Topping, Ontario on October 27, 1942, she was the daughter of Ervin and Verna Zehr. Lorene was a graduate of Stratford, Ontario, Canada Teachers College and Shippensburg University with degrees in Elementary Education.

She served with Mennonite Voluntary Service in Newfoundland, Canada teaching in a one-room schoolhouse. She was a long time staff member of Heritage Academy, Hagerstown, Maryland. She was also co-owner and partner with her husband of Mar-Mae Farm, Chambersburg, PA.

Most recently, she assisted Eugene with pastoral duties at their church. She was a member of Greenwood Assembly of God, Fayetteville, Pennsylvania. She was passionate about her family, her gardens and sharing Christ's love through her actions. A gifted teacher, Lorene will be best remembered for providing loving instruction and mentorship to her family, friends and students. In addition to her husband Eugene, Lorene is survived her children Lynn Martin and wife Lisa of Carlisle, Pennsylvania, Bradley Martin of Hagerstown, Maryland, and Jolene Eid, and husband Joe of Joppa, Maryland; by five grandchildren and five great-grandchildren; her siblings, Albert Zehr and wife Janet; Daniel Zehr; Ruth Cahill and husband Steven, Cathi Bender and husband Wray; Carol Rosevear and husband Allen, and Gloria Speeroff and

husband Bill; as well as numerous nieces, nephews and cousins.

Besides her parents, her was preceded in death by grandson, Luke Martin, brother David Zehr, and sister-in-law Elaine Zehr.

*After the untimely death of our mother, Emma, our dad, Ervin was left with three small boys, David, Daniel and I, Albert being the youngest. We were blessed with a “new momma,” Verna who laid aside her dreams to be a missionary to care for us boys. She prayed that if she was granted children she would not have boys since she might favor them over us three.*

*God honored her request and before long Lorene, the first of five girls arrived. I being four years older saw it as my responsibility to care for her whether she needed it or not. At about age four we noticed that she kept bumping into things and discovered she was losing her vision due to cataracts.*

*After a brutal surgery, she was heavily bandaged with her hands tied to the side of the bed. Our parents were asked not to be with her in case she might cry since tears might disrupt the healing. After several days, we were allowed to be present when the bandages were removed to discover if she would now be able to see. When she recognized us, we rejoiced not knowing whether to laugh or cry. Pictures were rare, but my favorite is Lorene and I sitting on a step at about age 3 and seven. As the man disappeared under the blanket behind the ancient camera, I encouraged her to, “watch for the birdie!”*

*Lorene, like her mother lived a selfless life, caring more for others than for herself, also leaving her career dreams, and her family to be a blessing to a man with small children. She also lived about the same number of years loving and serving the same Lord and master Jesus.*

*Our visits through the years were few, but each time was a powerful experience of love and encouragement, for Janet and I as our hearts were also deeply knitted with Eugene and his family. Besides caring for her family through marriage she blessed countless children through her teaching and served her church family, teaming with her ever loving husband Eugene pastoring a beautiful congregation.*

She was a gifted and outstanding teacher who always had the time, patience and effort to go the extra mile for her students. Before report cards were typed, Lorene let me print comments in her students' report cards as she said my printing was excellent! Lorene also had me help create lots of teaching aids for her classroom and I was hooked for life!*

*My first teaching position at a school located in a downtown area of London, ON in a classroom with 26 boisterous children was overwhelming! Their previous teacher was a "yeller", and sent them to the principal's office if they misbehaved; whereas I felt it was my job as their teacher to deal with challenging students myself.*

*Thanks be to God, Lorene came to the rescue! She had just arrived back from 2 years of teaching in Newfoundland and was available*

*until her next position started. I asked Lorene if she would spend a few days in my classroom, and give me some tips from her wealth of experience. Lorene as my teaching consultant, helped me gain new confidence in how to get my students' respect and cooperation. The old maxim that "one can catch more flies with honey than vinegar" took on new life when I witnessed first hand how Lorene's engaging voice and encouraging smile worked wonders on my most disruptive students! Indeed, Lorene could talk any obstinate student into "eating out of her hand"! She gave me new confidence in my classroom management skills, and transformed the environment into a magical place with pupils who wanted to listen, learn and explore! Receiving a gift of an illegal marijuana plant from one of my toughest students was proof Lorene's teaching methods worked!"*

“ Rick and I are so sorry for your loss. In addition to being my cousin, Lorene was a great friend. We had lots in common: both graduating from Stratford Teachers' College and becoming elementary school teachers. We both fell in love with handsome men from PA who took us from our beloved Ontario to live in the Keystone State. Though 100 miles apart we stayed connected via phone and occasional visits. A special memory I have of Lorene happened the summer of 1972. I brought a group of 13 students I taught in Puerto Rico for a trip to Ontario to visit their pen pals who had been my students in Bramalea, Ontario the previous year. One Saturday the plan was to visit African Lion Safari and Niagara Falls. Lorene helped to transport some students along with other friends.
